Dustin, I. T., Nov. 6.—Last night Deputy United States Marshall Tilley and Possemen Bun Rille and Kid Carlisle arrested Jim Upchurch, at Sualltown. Upchurch is charged with being a whiskey peddler. When the officers approached the house in which they had located Upchurch they called for him to come out. He went out—but through a window in the rear of the house, with his Winchester in his hand. After demanding his surrender the officers opened fire. Six shots were fired, but Upchurch very wisely refrained from returning the shots. Seeing no chance of escape Upchurch then surrendered and was taken to Okmulgee for preliminary hearing.
